JAZZ HIGH TEA AT ARTS CENTRE MELBOURNE AUGUST - DECEMBER PROGRAM

The Jazz High Tea series, now a beloved Arts Centre Melbourne tradition, features a different act on the first Sunday of every month until December. Combining Melbourne's two great loves, food and culture, this high-tea experience at The Pavilion is designed to delight all of the senses. Guests are greeted with a glass of bubbles on arrival, before indulging in house-made cakes, pastries, savoury delights, and freshly brewed tea.

In August, jazz-lovers have the opportunity to experience **Nostalgique**, four of Melbourne and Italy's best jazz musicians celebrating their love of the European song. Singer Tamara Kuldin, joined by Jon Delaney (guitar), Salvatore Greco (accordion) and Jonathan Zion (double bass) will perform songs from the likes of Serge Gainsbourg, Edith Piaf, The Barry Sisters and The Andrew Sisters.

Pam Wachira will delight audiences with her funk and soul music in September. Wachira taught herself to sing at the age of ten in Kenya, imitating her favourite artists of the 80s and 90s. Her powerful voice has been likened to a mix of Aretha Franklin, Lauryn Hill, Mary J. Blige and Nina Simone. Since migrating to Melbourne, she has rocked venues as a lead singer in bands such as K for Cool, The Jive Crank, Mondo Freaks and her own funk-soul band The Mad Poets.

In October, Melbourne jazz quartet, **Stevenson's Rockets** will serve up a diverse repertoire of jazz tunes and songs from the 20s and 30s. Led by Jo Stevenson on clarinet and saxophones, The Rockets are made up of pianist Stephen Grant, melodic bass player Chris Ludowyk and drummer Ian Smith, who also plays trumpet, bass, drums, washboard

and reeds. The name of the group derives from the steam engine built by George Stephenson in the 1700s and conveys the driving energy with which the group performs.

The **Shuffle Club** will perform their hot blend of jazz, swing, blues and boogie in November. Having made music together since 1999, the Melbourne-based band intuitively improvises to create beautiful harmonies and enhance solo performances.
